Stories, songs and rhymes provide lots of different opportunities to have fun with maths




'The Very Hungry Caterpillar' by Eric Carle

If you don't have this book at home, you could visit a library together to borrow a copy or you could search online.

By reading this lovely children's book you can have great fun and learn more about maths together.

As you share this book, talk about what you can see on each page, for example, pointing out the sun, the different foods, the caterpillar, the butterfly, etc. You can count the food the caterpillar has eaten - 'Let's see how many strawberries there are'.



Supporting your child to develop their language

Try to remember to wait and pause, give ten seconds for thinking time, listen to your child and then respond.


When you talk about the book together, pause between some of the comments or questions to give your child some time to think, time to understand and time to just enjoy each other's company.

Making it work for your family

At first, share the book together and let your child point to and / or talk about what interests them.
